

6.6 Behaviour Management Strategy

This strategy is for use with teams travelling to the Australian Schools Orienteering Championships and with participants at training camps for juniors. It may be adapted for other activities involving juniors.

Pre-event

Students agree to a formal Code of Behaviour. Ensure parents and team members/participants are aware that the Code of Behaviour is taken seriously by Team Officials/Camp personnel and that there will be consequences if participants do not respect it.

During event

- Team Managers and Coaches/Camp personnel debrief with each other at the end of each day regarding any behaviour and well-being concerns, clarifying any differences in perception and deciding how to address any issues.

For lower-level misdemeanours:

- First warning:
 - student is taken aside at appropriate time, to be reminded that their presence at camp or membership of the team is a privilege, in the case of ASOC they are representing their State, and that a high standard of behaviour is expected
 - student is reminded of the Code of Behaviour that they agreed to, with attention drawn to relevant items
 - student is told clearly that this is a formal warning.
- Second warning:
 - as above, but in addition parents are notified.
- Third instance:
 - student is sent home at parents' expense.

For major breaches (violence, vandalism, alcohol, etc.) the student is sent home immediately at parents' expense.
