

President's Report

2011 was our usual busy round of events in Queensland, and good representation at national and international events. We fared well financially, launched our new web site, won a QORF award and decided on some promising developments for 2012. The Queensland Championships in Maryborough, coordinated by Toohey Forest, attracted 150 competitors. Planning for the 2012 Australian 3 Days Championships continued through the year.

Membership in 2011 showed a slight increase over 2010. The new website, and changes to membership calculations this year should give us more reliable and useful data. The reporting already available from the new website and database is impressive and will contribute significantly to the future direction of Orienteering Queensland.

Participation, membership and funding are all closely related. We are steadily improving our tracking of participation statistics. Improving participation numbers improves our access to funding, increases revenue from events, increases exposure of the sport to Queenslanders, and raises our profile as a lead provider of sport and recreation to Queenslanders. All of these benefits ultimately ensure that orienteering grows and strengthens in Queensland.

In 2011 we also achieved a QORF Award, the Outstanding Achievement (Organisation) Award. I believe QORF has much to offer us in our efforts to promote and protect orienteering, and we shall maintain our membership in 2012.

Queensland orienteers were well represented in Australian teams and event results. Six Queenslanders were selected for the elite and junior Oceania Challenge plus two reserves, five athletes were selected for the veterans team Oceania Challenge plus three reserves, Rachel Effeney for WOC, gaining 35th place in the sprint (and winning the NZ Sprint the Bay to start 2012), three girls for the JWOC team plus 2 reserves. Chris Firman was selected for the MTBO World Championships team. Three Queenslanders and one reserve were in the Australia-New Zealand MTBO Challenge team.

Despite the reduced input to our schools programme from School Sports Queensland our juniors gained a good second place in the Australian Schools Championships, with some excellent individual performances, and a terrific outright (including New Zealand) win in the senior girls relay.

I'd like to thank Owen Richmond as Junior Development Officer for his contribution to the organisation over the last year. Owen has had to resign due to other commitments and he will be a loss as he was doing fine work for OQ, important work in light of our reduced support from School Sports Queensland. We hope to have appointed a replacement for Owen in early 2012.

The organisation's new website was launched in December 2011. This undertaking has been large and involved significant input from the project team. Much feedback has been received and will be taken into account. It will be necessary to prioritise the application of this feedback so I ask for some patience from members. I see this project as a major part of our promoting of orienteering to Queenslanders. I'd like to thank Frances Powell, Craig Steffens and Tim McIntyre for their work. Frances Powell continues to input significant time to the bedding down of the website.

For our Annual Conference we were fortunate to have as guest speaker Mikko Salonen from Finland. Mikko provided an interesting and thought provoking presentation as a result of which a number of initiatives for 2012 have been supported or developed, including an elite series to run through the year, and extension of the successful Street-O format to a year-round programme.

Our financial situation was much improved by the success of our application for funding from Sport and Recreation Queensland. The funding application was originally drafted by Fiona Calabro, Liz Bourne and Michael Burridge. This year we acquitted all of the \$70,000 funding.



Through OA we had access to ASC funding which carries over to this year. A number of maps have been developed in Capricornia and Far North Queensland with this funding and groundwork done for the holding of events in 2012. With good management we hope to establish an ongoing presence in these areas.

Finally, and most importantly, on behalf of the Management Committee, thanks to all those members who have contributed to the running of events for 2011. I believe we provided an excellent schedule of events in 2011, however the events calendar is becoming increasingly packed and a lot of work can fall to a few people in clubs to run these events. I urge anyone who has not yet participated in the administration of an event to approach your events coordinator and volunteer to assist at one event at

least for the coming year.

Administration

The Administration Officer's role has continued to grow in 2011. The primary purpose of this position is to maintain a high level of professionalism in all aspects of OQ administration and communications. The role now includes the membership, correspondence and minute secretarial roles, co-ordinating the annual conference, editing the annual report, preparation of statistical reports for Orienteering Australia and The Department of Communities and assisting with funding submissions. In addition, the Administration Officer produces the "Weekly Bulletin", posts information on the OQ website as well as administering the new OQ website. I have been ably assisted by Noelene Anderson (Correspondence), John Cooper (Participation) and Craig Steffens & Tim McIntyre (Web Site) for whose help I am as always grateful.

Sport & Recreation Qld (SRQ)

2011 saw OQ enter the first of a three year funding cycle of the 2011-2013 State Sport and Recreation Organisation Development Program. The funding agreement provides for \$210,000 of funding over the period of the agreement. This funding is directed towards increasing participation in schools, regional areas and mountain bike orienteering; maintaining junior squad programs; enhancing the new website and increasing training opportunities – all targeted to help grow our sport.

Statistics – OA & Department of Communities

The annual statistical report for Orienteering Australia and Department of Communities Qld includes events, participation, membership, committee membership, numbers of accredited coaches and controllers, school activities and mapping. We continue to improve our membership, event and participation databases with the aim of providing a single source for accurate and timeous reports.

QORF (Queensland Outdoor Recreation Federation)

Throughout the year, we have had continued involvement with QORF, much of this involvement is by Rob Simson and Reid Moran.

Weekly Bulletin

The weekly e-bulletin continues to be the major way of communicating with our members on a regular basis. At the end of 2011 the PDF format of the bulletin was replaced with a web enabled format, members and non-members are now able to subscribe and unsubscribe to the bulletin via the OQ website. The new web enable bulletin also allows us to collect statistics on how many members actually read the bulletin.

New OQ Logo



The new OQ logo was launched in late 2011 (shown on the right), after a competition was run for members to design a new logo. Wendy Read's, submission was the winner (her submission is shown on the left) .The criteria for a new logo were simple, it needed to be relevant to Queensland and Orienteering.

Junior Development

In 2011 I continued to focus on increasing the involvement and participation of school age children (Juniors) in Orienteering in Queensland through the following strategies:

- 1. Increasing teacher interest in orienteering through the provision of quality resources and training; and visiting schools which show an interest in developing orienteering programs.
- 2. Raising the profile of orienteering activities with juniors and parents through website development, provision of marketing materials and activities and attendance and participation in junior camps and training activities.

Outcomes against specific tasks allocated in the JDO position description are detailed below.

A good working relationship has been maintained with key personnel at Queensland School Sport (QSS) and we have had their support for the following events:

15 Apr 11 / 20 Jan 12 Teacher In-Service training at Yeronga State High School,

29 May 'All Schools' event at Whites Hill,

23-24 Jul QSO Champs at Yeronga and Parkinson, and

30 Sep-9 Oct QLD Schools Team attending ASOC in Victoria and NSW.

I completed 341 hours of work from an allocation of 400 hours in 2011. This averaged seven hours a week, and given that some events (e.g. Teacher in-service) require 25-30 hours concentrated effort in one week I believe that my overall coverage was not adequate to provide a good level of service to OQ. This is one reason I have decided not to continue as JDO and I believe that to do the job justice, the position must be filled with someone who can dedicate at least two days a week with considerable flexibility to meet key event dates and school support requests.

Based on my initial guidance and prioritisation of duty statement tasks I have deliberately focussed on tasks that contribute to the provision of resources, or collective events rather than one off school visits. I recommend that the OQ Management Committee continue with the prioritisation rather than shifting to focus on individual school assistance.

Specific Task Progress

- 1 Develop and maintain School Orienteering page on the OQ website.
 - During the year the 'Schools' Website was updated and contains a number of key resources including the Schools map database, GOP lesson plans and other teacher resources.
 - b) It is quite disappointing to see the Schools Orienteering link pushed of the front page of the new website and is now listed under 'About Orienteering'.
 This is a step backwards and I recommend a link be placed back on the home page.
 - c) I am still unable to gain access to the Schools pages since the roll out of the new website and hence it is now out of date. Provision of training on accessing and updating the new website should be a key priority for the induction of the new JDO.
 - 2 Develop orienteering information packages and teaching resources for distribution to schools, sporting and outdoor education organisations
 - a. **Newsletters.** The JDO has produced regular 'Schools Orienteering' newsletters sent to QSS for distribution to schools through regional



Sports Officers. Newsletters have been published as follows: 9 Feb 11 – updated and reissued in April, 23 Nov 11 and 1 Mar 12.

- b) **Map Database**. The 'Schools' Map database now has 135+ school suitable maps listed.
- c) Resource Packs. The JDO has assembled and produced 10 mail-out resource packs for schools at a cost of approximately \$30 per pack (not costing labour). 5 packs have been distributed to schools so far with a positive response. The packs contain:
 - A paper copy of Games Orienteers Play lesson plans and a number of OQ flyers
 - b. A resource CD with a number of electronic orienteering resources
 - c. Materials to produce 10 ½ size (school/park) core flute orienteering controls.

3 Keep records of interested schools, teachers and club contacts that can help with the junior program.

The current O Schools listing contains 125 entries and has been used for newsletter distribution and updates. A copy was passed to key members of the Schools Committee on 6 Feb.

4 Regularly report progress and communicate with Schools Committee (QSO) and the State Development Officer.

The JDO has attended most Schools Committee and Ops Meetings throughout the year. Written reports have not always been provided due to time constraints.

5 Co-ordinate in-service programs for teachers on student-free days.

Teacher's In-service days were conducted on 15th April 11 (15 attended) and 20 Jan 12 (7 attended), both at Yeronga State High School. Though attendance has been rather disappointing, the feedback from teachers attending has been very positive, and I believe teacher training must remain a priority for development of junior involvement in Qld Orienteering.

6 Conduct on-site programs for member schools.

I have conducted a training day for Guides Queensland 11 Jun. I have had many enquiries for advice and several requests to visit schools and conduct program, however none of these visits were able to be successfully arranged due to conflicting availability of both school teachers and JDO. To provide good availability to schools the person filling the JDO position should ideally have availability on every day of the week.

7 Conduct regional promotions for juniors with help of clubs.

I have supported All Schools and QSO series in 2011, assisted with the AASC Supers Sports Fun Day on 14 Apr, the QORF Expo on 1 Oct, and after contacting Little Athletics Qld have provided Qld Orienteering clubs with contacts details for LAQ clubs in their feeder areas to facilitate local recruiting.

I would like to publicly thank the Schools Committee and OQ Executive for their support over the last 18 months. I would particularly like to thank Rob Simson, Fiona Calabro, Liz Bourne and Frances Powell for their friendship, support and patience.

Though I am currently unable to continue as JDO I hope to see many of you at orienteering events in the future. Good running (or walking, as the case may be).

Queensland School Orienteering



Thanks to the efforts of the Coaching Coordinator and the Junior Development Officer, there have been increasing numbers of teachers attending coaching accreditation courses and in-service programs so the quality of school based orienteering should be improving. Still we are yet to see a pay-off in the number of students joining orienteering clubs or attending events especially targeted at school children. The best area of growth in school orienteering has certainly been in the Toowoomba district, through the untiring efforts of Felicity Crosato and Stacey Nottle.

The All Schools Challenge at Whites Hill in May attracted only 34 students and the Queensland School Orienteering Championship, at Yeronga and Parkinson, in July, had only 73 starters, well down on previous years. The championship event was very successful with excellent courses set by Cyclones members, Emily Cantwell and Oliver Mitchell. Individual class winners were as follows:

The Queensland School Orienteering team was selected at the QSO Championships and travelled south for the Australian School Orienteering Championships and Oceania Carnival starting in NE Victoria and finishing at Cooma. Though the team failed to retain the Shield, finishing second to a very good Tasmanian team, there were many excellent performances, and Heather Muir, Jacqui Doyle, Rebecca Freese, Matt Doyle and Winnie Oakhill were named in the National Honour Team.

The most exciting race of the carnival was the ASOC Senior Girls Relay when Heather Muir sprinted home to just edge out the star-studded New Zealand girls team. Congratulations to Heather Muir and Winnie Oakhill who won their individual events in Senior Girls and Junior Girls respectively.

Once again Joan Sheldon was the key QSO Team manager, assisted this time by Reid Moran. Fiona Calabro again took on the team coaching role with assistance from Neil Simson, For so many years our team officials have done an excellent job carrying the burden of the organisational paper work, team uniforms, travel, transport and team supervision. They deserve much of the credit for the excellent results of the QSO Team in recent years.

Finally thanks to the Orienteering Queensland Schools Committee members, especially, the excellent work of Mike Burridge as treasurer, and Leanne O'Shea as secretary.

Coaching and Training Programmes

Ultra Mini Cyclones

The year began with a well-attended BBQ, a scatter course with handrails and a Street O activity. Local youths destroyed some of the borrowed equipment. Following that a large chunk of Ultra-Mini funding went towards the purchase of flags and punches, including competition flags as well as corflute flags and ice-cream bucket flags.

Mother's day, was a most serious event in the Ultra-Mini calendar with a treasure chest full of jewellery (for Mum) for the



winning team in a fast paced family-relay-sprint. Only a few seconds between 1st, 2nd and 3rd places made this a very exciting relay, won by the Powell team.

The new *Robelle Domain* Park O map, proved to be another fantastic relay venue, with it's tricky high and low bridges, tracks and boardwalks. Everyone relied on our youngest Ultra-Mini, 7 year old Mikaela Gray, to do the navigating.

A very enthusiastic team of Ultra-Mini's and friends turned out to *Whites Hill* for the all schools challenge. A very strong team from Indooroopilly State School led by fathers Brenton Gray and Mikko Salonen set out to even the score with the Powell's who came with just one team from Fig Tree Pocket State School.

Two badge events and the state champs provided the opportunity to get the kids together to learn some navigation theory. Topics covered included reading contours, understanding IOF clue descriptions, and a mapping exercise.

At the end of year BBQ, a new concept for a scatter course was born. A ten control scatter set around playground equipment. The challenge was to find two controls, then come back to the playground leaving in a different direction to visit two more controls. Continue until all ten controls were found. With flags flat on the ground, a very simple scatter course became a complicated challenge involving distance estimation, precise compass work, map reading, route choice and quick thinking. The Powell's were victorious again.

The year ended with Jen Woods (squad manger) recording game and relay formats used by Ultra-Mini's to share with other coaches of primary school age orienteers.

Strong personal performances throughout the year saw 14 out of 20 Ultra-Minis invited to join Mini Cyclones on camp in January 2012. Many of these kids have been offered a place in Mini cyclones, leaving Ultra-Mini cyclones in need of a recruitment drive in 2012.

Coach Education

Level 0 Courses: Level 0 courses were conducted at Texas, by Liz Bourne on 23rd June, for 4 teachers; Maroon OEC on 12th July, for 14 teachers; and Mark Munnings at Maroon Outdoor education Centre, on 5th December, for 5 teachers.

Level 1 Course: Two Level 1 Courses were conducted in 2011; Atherton Tableland, for 28 participants, and Fairbairn Dam, via Emerald, for 4 participants.

New accreditations: 17 new Level 1 coaches were registered this year, including 2 from Stanthorpe, 4 from SE Qld, 4 from Emerald, 6 from North Qld, and a coach welcomed from New Zealand.

Coach Accreditation: 14 Level 1, and 1 Level 2 coaches were reaccredited. 2 have now moved interstate.

Accredited coaches: The numbers have risen to 73: 63 Level 1, 8 Level 2, and 2 Level 3 coaches.

Suitability Cards: All coaches working with children now need Suitability Cards. OQ now has a Child protection Risk Management Plan, in accordance with State Government requirements.

Awards: The Coaching Award went to Felicity Crosato for her work with the Range Runners Club, and Darling Downs schools team.

Performances by Queenslanders at national events

Promotion and Development

Promotion

A reprint of the colour orienteering brochure was done in February and distributed to all of the clubs for use in their promotional activities.

In April, OQ participated in a Kid's Super Sports Fun Day at the Clem Jones Centre involving 500 local Year 4 and 5 students. A map of the centre was made and a simple scatter course organised for the 120 students who elected to try out orienteering on the day.

In May, OQ organised another urban orienteering event out of King George Square in Brisbane City with good participation from a range of new people who enjoyed this fun way to explore the city.

The Brisbane clubs participated in the Brisbane City Council's Far Out Forest holiday activities over three days in the Mt Coot-tha Botanic Gardens in July. A couple of simple and fun orienteering kid's activities were organised in the Gardens with good feedback from the families who participated.

OQ once again participated in the Queensland Outdoor Recreation Federation's Active Outdoors Expo at a new location at Bayside Park at Manly in October. As well as a display, there were a couple of street/park orienteering courses offered with quite a few family groups taking up the opportunity to try out orienteering.

The Brisbane clubs continued their involvement with the Brisbane City Council's Active Parks Program, while a number of other local councils also involved orienteering in their active lifestyles programs. This is providing a good opportunity for clubs to promote orienteering in the local community, using the Councils' publicity and marketing resources.

Media

Regional newspapers continued to give good media coverage of orienteering throughout the year, including reporting on the performances of local athletes. The response of Brisbane's community newspapers was more disappointing, with only limited coverage of both events and the achievements of local orienteers. Orienteering was included in a feature article about outdoor activities for children that was published by the Sunday Mail in late December and featuring the Gray family.

The orienteering story on Totally Wild that was filmed the previous August in Anzac Park at Toowong with eight of our juniors was finally screened nationally in April and elicited a good response. At very short notice, The Great South East program asked us to participate in a story on our permanent courses in some of the city parks. This was filmed in the City Botanic Gardens in June and went to air in September.

Regional Development

Maryborough

A number of club and state events were conducted in the Maryborough region during the year which enabled some limited local participation to occur.

Gold Coast

This region continues to generate an increasing number of inquiries from people interested in trying out orienteering. However, the lack of suitable areas of bushland for mapping is a major constraint and efforts have been put into finding more urban parklands that might lend themselves to orienteering. The Hinterland Regional Park at Mudgeeraba seems to have some potential and will be



mapped during 2012. An event was conducted at Musgrave Park at Southport in June and this attracted a number of new and keen people, including several from northern New South Wales. We have also been working with the NSW Association to try and foster their development of a club in the Northern Rivers region as there is also considerable interest here.

Rockhampton and Cairns

As part of its successful participation funding application to the Australian Sports Commission announced in 2010, Orienteering Australia has allocated funding to OQ for development work in Cairns and Rockhampton.

Maps of three street/park areas in both cities were produced over winter and some basic gear acquired to enable them to conduct a series of events during 2012. Further assistance and technical training will be provided to facilitate their organisational and course setting skills.

A new club has just been established in Cairns, the Far North Orienteering Club, where there is already a strong following for adventure sports and rogaining. In Rockhampton, there is also keen interest and they hope to start a series of street/park-O events there in June. Money has been allocated in the 2012 budget to enable further mapping work to be done in both cities to aid in club development.

Hi-Tech

This year saw the introduction of a new web-site for Orienteering Queensland. Thanks to the hard work of Craig Steffens and Frances Powell, the new system was designed, commissioned and tested before coming live near the end of 2011. The system features include

- A new overall design
- A new member management system allowing members and an administrator to edit the data
- A new event management system including a variety of exports
- A new event entry system suitable for small and large events

While now fully in use, input is welcome in terms of content, photos and other constructive feedback.

Sportident timing usage has expanded further in 2011 with the Brisbane clubs and the Mountain Bike club all possessing individual equipment sets. The majority of our club and state events now use Sportident timing including, street, park and bush events. As ever, there remains a shortage of trained operators — so please consider becoming involved. The software is generally straightforward and easy to use once one becomes familiar with the style.

With increasing emphasis on the collection of statistics, effort has been put into streamlining this process. John Cooper has developed software to assist in preparing results for non-Sportident events and also for collecting statistics over all events. There have also been upgrades to the results website which now facilitates the exporting of participation statistics based on age and gender.




Mapping

2010 Queensland Championships Report

Event site

Toohey Forest Orienteering Club was pleased to present the 37th Queensland Orienteering Championships. It has been a tradition since the 1980s to make the Championships a two day event, with the first day in recent years doubling as the Queensland Middle Distance Championships for the M/W17-20A and the M/W21A.

When the club was unable to identify a suitable new area south of Brisbane, it was decided to again make use of the excellent forest areas west of Maryborough as the event location. Geoff



Peck identified a suitable area extending north from Eric Andrew's Hidden Glen map into a new area of Wongi State Forest that included the granite covered slopes of Cabbage Tree Mountain. Using this area meant that for fourth time since 2006, the Queensland Orienteering Championships took place near Aramara around 30km west of Maryborough.

Mapping

Negotiations were undertaken with the Queensland Parks and Wildlife Service for access for mapping and a permit for the event. The holders of the grazing leases, Gay and Colin Rockemer and Les Howard were contacted and both parties were happy to cooperate with our organizers.

Eric Andrews extended the eastern section of the 2008 Hidden Glen map to provide an area of excellent terrain for the first day and Geoff Peck undertook the mapping of the Cabbage tree Mountain block. Geoff combined the two maps and the TFO team worked with on map file all the way through field checking, course setting and controlling. Separate maps for each days courses were only prepared about 8 days out from the event. The Day1 maps were then called Cloudy Creek and the Day2 maps named Cabbage Tree Mountain.

Logistics

For a Brisbane club conducting a major event 4 hours driving time away from our home base the event presented some significant logistical problems. Fortunately we had the Ugly Gully logistics report from the 2010 event to refer to. Reid Moran came on board to help the organizer, Rob Simson and the course setters in accessing and transporting the equipment needed. TFO decided against hauling the heavy OQ trailer to Maryborough and chose to use the TF trailer, an additional caged trailer that could take a big load, and our own vehicles to transport the equipment. Jim Bowling from Enoggeroos assisted by bringing the mid-week



event shelter to use for the kids play area and transported this and the toilet pedestals back to Brisbane for us.

Assembly area



near the parking area.

After investigating several possibilities it was decided to choose an assembly area on a gently sloping spur only 600m in from the Maryborough-Biggenden Road. This location allowed the course setters to use the one pre-start and common finish both days. The area needed a lot of clearing of fallen timber and other rubble to make space for parking, assembly area facilities and the finish chute. As a result of this effort we had an excellent assembly area made more agreeable by the addition of a kids play area, a games set up and string course with a story theme, all planned and arranged by Jen Woods. This facility had its own bush toilet separate from those provided for competitors and spectators which were situated

Website and entry system

The Championship webpage was added to the OQ website in February. The work of setting this up was done by Julie Irvine (IDomain). Fiona Calabro designed the logo and preliminary information, photos and map samples were added to the site. The online entry was set up by Julie and posted in early June with a closing date of 8 August. Three late entries were received and they each paid the \$25 late fee. Dinner bookings were included with the entry. The program went up about two weeks before the event and the start list followed two days later. All but two participants used the on-line entry system.

Courses and winning times

Excellent courses were set by Jim Dougall (Day 1) and Mark Nemeth (Day 2). Winning times were generally slower than the winning times set out in the OQ Organization Manual. In several classes this was chiefly due to the poor quality of the fields, the M21A being a good example. All the feedback from the competitors was positive, and all seemed to blame their slow times on errors in navigating. However, in hindsight, on day 2 a little more heed could have been made to the effects of the climb.



Championship Dinner

The Championship Dinner was very successful. We were fortunate to be able to book a private room with PA, bar, and table service for \$225 at the Carriers Arms Hotel in Maryborough. The Fraser Coast Mayor was represented by Councillor Brendan O'Connell who spoke well and presented the Middle Distance M21A & W21A winners with their trophies.



Mid-Week Orienteering



Mid-Week Orienteering numbers were up again compared to previous years but still averaged about 34 people each week for our 45 events. In total, 1525 people participated in our event schedule throughout the year. We had some very wet days, but the die-hards still come and we only cancel if we are really flooded out! We didn't cancel at all during the year but it was a bit sad to run around Graceville in February due to the effect of the floods. Participation rates have doubled since 2003, and quadrupled in ten years.

We have a good social element to our reasonably laid back orienteering events in the bush and parks in or near Brisbane where you are able to get a good competitive or recreational run. A number of people bring lunch and continue to socialize after the events. It would be good to have more maps but we have a pretty varied schedule.

We try to keep it simple for organisers and generally offer three red courses. We always encourage newcomers and can offer limited instruction. All ages are welcome. We get a very good cross section of the orienteering community: children in school holidays, students, employed and retired people, the odd person from interstate or overseas who have seen our website. Start times are between 12 noon and 1.00pm from March to October, and between 10 and 11am from November to February.

We also offer an easy course when we are sponsored by the Brisbane City Council GOLD and GOLD in Kids programs. We had a record eight of these free events during the year, and therefore able to add \$4000 to the OQ funds. We find that the GOLD in Kids events attract the most people (both attracted around 70 this year including a lot of newcomers) since they are always on during school holidays. At these sponsored events we give full instruction.

The Mid Week Championships were held at Scribbly Gum Creek. We had a good competitive event and an awards ceremony and BBQ afterwards. Thanks to Rob and Jim for organising this event.

Volunteer organisers are always needed and there is no better way to get in on understanding the sport than to organise a Thursday event. It's a great way to improve your orienteering knowledge and skills.

In 2012 we are organizing an event at Hardings Paddock near Ipswich as part of the Easter Carnival and attracting about 100 entries. This event will also have enter on the day, use Sport Ident and have a free BBQ included in the entry fee of \$10.

A very big thanks to all our organisers, without whom we would not be able to put on such a varied program throughout the Brisbane area all through the year.

Mountain Bike Orienteering

Eight Rider of the Year (ROY) events were organised during 2011 plus a number of Come and Try It and promotional events. A Du-O event was organised at Springfield in January and this attracted good numbers.

The Queensland MTBO Championships, organised by the Multi Terrain Bike Orienteers, were held on 30/31 July in hoop pine plantations outside Yarraman. David Firman was the course setter for the Middle Distance event at Pidna State Forest on the Saturday while Reid Moran did the Long Distance race at Yarraman the next day.



A good contingent of 12 Queensland riders competed in the Oceania and Australian MTBO Championships near Beechworth in Victoria in October. The Middle Distance race was conducted at Yackandandah, in very complex gold mining terrain with a multitude of tracks. At a scale of 1:5,000, the map provided plenty of challenges for riders having to read the fine detail, especially the indistinct minor tracks. In the M20E field, Chris Firman was placed 3rd while Craig Steffens gained a 5th placing in his M40 course over the same distance. Richard Robinson also came 5th in the M50 class and Murray Withers won the Men's Open 2 course. Of the local women riders, Tamsin Barnes came second in her W40 class.

The Sprint Distance race was conducted on the Saturday morning in mainly urban parkland around Beechworth with a variety of roads and paths. Chris Firman gained a 2nd placing in this event, Craig Holland a 3rd in M40; Richard Robinson a 3rd in M50 and Tamsin Barnes a 3rd in W40.

The Long Distance event was conducted at a venue 10km from Beechworth in an area containing mainly pine plantation and eucalypt forest in hilly terrain. The tracks varied from unsealed roads to bush tracks and some single track. Chris Firman was placed 3rd in M20E; Allan Uhlmann came 2nd second in M40; Karl Withers a 2nd placing in the Men's Open B class and Tamsin Barnes a 3rd again in W40.

Chris Firman (EN) was selected in the Australian team to compete at the Junior World Mountain Bike Championships which were held in Italy in August. His inclusion followed some excellent rides in the Victorian MTBO Championships held on 9 and 10 April and which also doubled as the selection trials. Chris won his M20 class in the Long Distance race and came third in the Middle Distance race the next day. Chris performed very creditably at the World Championships although his performance in the Long Distance event was affected by severe heat stress.

Thirteen Queensland riders travelled to New Zealand in January to participate in a multi-day MTBO Carnival in the Central Otago area on the South Island. The event also was an Australian/New Zealand Challenge and Craig Steffens (MTB) was appointed as the Australian team manager. A number of Queenslanders were part of the representative team — Paulo Jun Alvear Fujii (M20), Chris Firman (M20), Karl Withers (M20), Craig Steffens (M40), David Firman (M60) and Andrew Campbell (M60).

Chris Firman (EN) was the best performed of the Queensland riders in winning the sprint, Middle and Long Distance races in his M20 class at the Carnival.





NOTE 1:

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts are a special purpose financial report and have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards issued by the Australian Accounting bodies and the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (Queensland).

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the following Australian Accounting Standards:

AAS 5 Materiality

AAS 8 Events Occurring After Reporting Date

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical cost except where stated, and does not take into account changing money values or current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial statements.

(A) Incorporation

Orienteering Queensland Inc. is officially incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981.

(B) Income Tax

Generally, by virtue of Section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act, sporting bodies are exempt from Income Tax. However, should any income tax liability arise in the future such liabilities can only relate to the net assessable income generated from investment or other activities which are not directly associated with contributions, subscriptions or other receipts from members.

(C) Inventories

Inventories, being stocks of maps, are valued at the lesser of cost and net realisable value.

(D) Fixed Assets

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over their useful life to the Association. The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by the Committee of Management to ensure that it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of these assets.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the assets useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(E) Prior year Comparisons

A major accounts restructure was done for 2011, and some of the prior year figures have been recategorised to maintain correct comparison.

Maps have become a hybrid asset. They are are now mostly digital data.

The balance of \$1,818 represents pre-expenditure on special map paper for the 2012 Australian Championships which will be held in Queensland.

Some physical maps remain in stock from pre data storage days, but these have bee written off in the books.

The members of Orienteering Queensland Inc, are responsible for the preparation of the financial report, and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1, is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Qld) and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The members' responsibility also includes such internal control as the members determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the association's preparation of the financial report that gives a true and fair view, in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the association's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the officers, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Auditor's Opinion

As is common for organisations of this type, it is not practical for the association to maintain effective systems of internal control over donations, subscriptions and other fundraising activities until their initial entry into the accounting records. Accordingly, our audit in relation to such receipts was limited to amounts recorded.

Qualified Opinion

Basis of Accounting and Restriction on Distribution


