

President's Report

Welcome to the 2013 Annual General Meeting of Orienteering Queensland Inc.

2013 continued the trend of increasing activity for Orienteering Queensland, with differing and new formats across the state. Brisbane Night Nav had a successful run and appears off to a great start in 2014. The Gold Coast residents saw the return of regular events, with good turnouts, as Mark Roberts and his dedicated band injected great enthusiasm and energy into the project. Northern and Central Queensland clubs have also acquitted themselves very well over the year. In Rockhampton a particularly fine effort by Mark Murray was the main driver there. Mark received the President's Award 2013 for his efforts.

Our juniors performed well at Nationals and good promise and depth is evident in our current squad. Given the small schools base from which we are currently working, this promise suggests that continuing to strengthen the schools programme should return a good supply of athletes for development.

Membership in 2013 showed slight increase, participation showed a continuing and healthy increase over 2012. Thanks again to our statisticians, John Cooper and Frances Powell for the tricky work involved in capturing these figures.

A couple of projects driven by clubs have been completed. One was an updating of the Permanent Courses managed by Ugly Gully. Part of this funding was directed to exploring and establishing better marketing processes.

The other project, led by Enoggeroos, was to explore issues surrounding succession planning, and develop plans and strategies to manage this important part of our continued growth and success.

The deliverables from these projects have been made, or shall shortly be made, to all clubs in Queensland.

At Annual Conference our guest speaker was Dr Chris Schmidt whose topic was Trends, *Relevance and Capacity Building* (in volunteer-led organisations). Chris was also the employed consultant for the Succession Planning project and his involvement in both of these contacts with Orienteering worked very well. One of the points arising from both these interactions was the role of volunteers and how we as an organisation manage our volunteering programmes. This should form an important part of OQ development activity in 2014.

The Eventor event management system was the focus of the Conference afternoon session. Discussion is still alive and pertinent regarding this system, but a decision does not appear to be straightforward. Action on the system forthcoming from Orienteering Australia will be important in any decision. We will continue exploring the options in 2014.

In my 2012 report I touched on future Australian Sports Commission funding incorporating indicators for "go-ahead" sports (web sites performance, new programmes and diversification, bulletin subscriptions etc) and that I hoped in 2013 to see revised committees tackling some of these issues in a Queensland context. Work has been done on developing a possible new structure for OQ which will establish these committees and hopefully invigorate more of our governance responsibilities. These include the promotion of our sport and activities, development of our athletes at all levels via pathways, and as mentioned above, better volunteer management. Tied to volunteer management is the provision of adequate and quality resources, training, and succession planning. All aimed at growing the organisation and our sport.



Financially we are well placed but trending to some deficits over the last couple of years. This is reflected in our financial report and in some price rises occurring for events. These should come as little surprise as we have had no rises for quite some years now, and orienteering is still a very cheap sport at the local level, and at National level if you leave out the travel expenses. There have been efforts made in the last year or two to reduce travel expenses also by sourcing event maps which are easier to reach.

Finally, and most importantly, on behalf of the Management Committee, congratulations to those who have excelled in their orienteering adventures, and thanks to all those members who have contributed to the running of events, teams and clubs for 2013. Our most valuable resource is our volunteers and we should be putting special effort into conserving and growing this resource.

Happy Orienteering in 2014.

2013 Award Winner was Gail Campbell here is her Letter from Sunshine Orienteers.



Administration is one of those thankless and less glamorous tasks that, if handled well simply happens, but if handled poorly results in many disgruntled competitors and gives a club a bad reputation. It is with pleasure that the Sunshine Orienteers Club Inc. puts forward Gail Campbell's name as a nominee for the 2013 Orienteering Queensland Zonta Award. As a developing orienteering club we appreciate this opportunity to recognize her commitment and contribution to orienteering, specifically on the Sunshine Coast. Gail and her husband Bruce have been involved with orienteering for 24 years and after moving to the Sunshine Coast in 2000 joined the fledgling Sunshine Orienteers Club. Gail has held positions on the Sunshine Orienteers committee since she joined our club 13 years ago, along with organizing events, field checking and mapping many of our club Foot and Mountain Bike Orienteering events.

Gail is both an individual and team contributor to the success of the Sunshine Orienteers Club. She is currently our treasurer and manages the administration for all our events.

She is an extremely organized and efficient person who dedicates a huge amount of behind the scenes time to ensure that the data for each and every event is as accurate as possible. Her focus on delivering simplified administration makes for smooth running of events - a task that is not often acknowledged and goes unnoticed. For this reason we want to raise awareness of the many hundreds of unrecognized hours of work that Gail has put into helping build the credibility of the Sunshine Orienteers. For the competitor the race may take as little as an hour to complete, unbeknownst to them, Gail works tirelessly behind the scenes for days in the lead up to the events. All data is manually checked before being uploaded to the club laptop, start lists are printed out, registration lists and outstanding monies are collated, result labels printed out, map board hire and SI stick hire lists checked and cross checked to ensure there are no hiccups on the day. With our club hosting MTBO events we average 80 competitors per event and sometimes even the experienced orienteers can get it wrong....

- Insisting they don't need to bring their SI stick to rego to be checked only to discover they have attached their child's or partners stick to their bike;
- Quoted their child's SI stick number when entering!!
- Assume entry fees have been paid by their partner!!
- Paid their entry fees to OQ or another club and not to SO!!

All minor hiccups, but when multiplied by more than a few can present a few headaches, especially at the download station when you are told you have been mispunched for not having the correct SI stick. When you have someone with the dedication of Gail managing your administration, all these issues are easily managed.

Gail is a dependable and punctual person, usually the first at an event to help set up and the last to go having collected controls, pulled the assembly area down and packed the trailer up. She makes a thankless, but vital, task look easy!

This is an opportunity to publically acknowledge her contribution to which we are eternally thankful. Congratulations Gail.

Administration

The Administration Officer's roll is to focus on maintaining a high level of professionalism in all aspects of OQ administration and communications. The role includes the membership, correspondence and minute secretarial roles, co-ordinating the annual conference, editing the annual report, OA Mag distribution, preparation of statistical reports for Orienteering Australia and The Department of Communities and assisting with funding submissions. Much assistance has been provided by both Frances Powell & John Cooper with their never ending hard work on the statistical reports. In 2014 the Administration roll will be looking to forward plan and have more involvement from all OQ members.

Statistics – OA & Department of Communities

The annual statistical report for Orienteering Australia and Department of Communities Qld includes events, participation, membership, committee membership, numbers of accredited coaches and controllers, school activities and mapping. We continue to improve our membership, event and participation databases with the aim of providing a single source for accurate and timeous reports.

Weekly Bulletin

The weekly e-bulletin continues to be the major way of communicating with our members on a regular basis. At the end of 2011 the PDF format of the bulletin was replaced with a web enabled format, members and non-members are now able to subscribe and unsubscribe to the bulletin via the OQ website. The new web enable bulletin also allows us to collect statistics on how many members actually read the bulletin. With the success of the bulletin and the increased work load the weekly bulletin has become a paid part time position with Kayleen taking on the role and continuing on for another calendar year ahead.

Sport & Recreation QId (SRQ)

2013 saw OQ enter the third year of a three year funding cycle of the 2011-2013 State Sport and Recreation Organisation Development Program. The funding agreement provides for \$210,000 of funding over the period of the agreement. This funding is directed towards increasing participation in schools, regional areas and mountain bike orienteering; maintaining junior squad programs; enhancing the new website and increasing training opportunities – all targeted to help grow our sport. 2014 makes a new year for funding and much work will go into the documents required.

Queensland School Orienteering

During 2013 the only area of the state that showed an increase in school orienteering activity has been the Darling Downs, and in particular the Toowoomba Region. The reasons for this are abundantly clear. Firstly there is the support and encouragement by Darling Downs School Sport, the only region of the state that continues to conduct regional trials and support a regional team to participate in the annual QSO Championships. Since 2008 no other school QSS region has provided this extent of encouragement to young orienteers. Secondly there is a small group of teachers led by Felicity Crosato who believe wholeheartedly in the educational value of our sport, and promote it enthusiastically in local schools. Thirdly they have the advantage of having country press outlets that are willing to give the sport considerable media exposure, a benefit not often available to Brisbane clubs where the major sports dominate the press coverage.

The success of the Darling Downs endeavours has resulted in over 50% of the Mini Cyclones and Junior Cyclones being members of Darling Downs clubs, either RR or BBB; while ten of the Schools orienteering team out of the 16 members plus 4 reserves were also from the Darling Downs.

The All Schools Challenge proposed for Brisbane in June was cancelled because it failed to attract Darling Downs school support and no Brisbane school has enough active orienteers to show an interest. We have considered changing the format back to a Mini Rogaine but finding a suitable date has proved difficult.

Queensland School Orienteering Championships were held on the first weekend in August. The Perseverance Dam map was used for the relays with Wim deJong setting the courses under Felicity Crosato's guidance. The sprint was conducted later the same day using a new map by Felicity Crosato at Highfields. Alison Burrill set the courses. The bush challenge was held on an updated version of part of the Woodlands map with Sam Anderson as the course setter. This year we included separate M11 & W11 courses to encourage more primary school student participation. Winners of the individual events were as follows:

Toowoomba Grammar had been announced as the Champion school but following a recheck this was awarded to St. Ursula's. Congratulations to the team at St. Ursula's being named our premier orienteering school for the first time.

The Queensland School Orienteering team was selected at the QSO Championships at Woodlands. The team of 16 plus four junior reserves travelled to the ACT for the Australian Orienteering Championships carnival. They finished third behind Victoria and Tasmania in a tight competition. It was a good team effort with standout performances by Simeon Burrill and Winnie Oakhill, plus the



Junior Girls team which won both the team and relay events in their class. Simeon Burrill, Riley de Jong and Winnie Oakhill were named in the National Honour team.

Once again we owe a debt of gratitude to the Junior Development Officer, Lisa Purcell, who helped handle all the paper work and the liaison with Queensland School Sport. Reid Moran and Joan Sheldon again took on team management, assisted by coaches, Neil Simson; and first time assistant coach, Crystal Neumann. Once again the management team did an excellent job and reported that the team cooperation and behaviour was excellent throughout the tour. Special thanks also to Michael Burridge who helped arranged the flights and hire coach bookings and other financial aspects of the tour.

The small OQ Schools Committee continues to function well. It is great to have dedicated people working around you. Lisa Purcell's efforts to promote more effective orienteering programs in primary schools in the western Brisbane suburbs is to be commended and we look forwards to seeing how the schools respond.

Mini Cyclones Squad

During 2013, 25 juniors participated in the Mini Cyclones, Junior Incentive Program. The program aims to encourage 12-14 year olds to develop a love of our sport and to foster support from their parents. Talented 11 year olds may also be included.

Most of the squad participated in the annual Mini Cyclones training camp, this time at Kindilan Outdoor Education Centre, Redland Bay. We also invited some of the more able Ultra-Mini Cyclones to join in. As well as the Kindilan map, we made use of the Stockyard Creek map at Burbank on the first day, and the Scribbly Gums Forest map at Cleveland on the second day. Thanks to the parents who came along to help, especially Meredith Gray who worked with the younger ones, Aaron Simson-Woods for his enthusiastic involvement as coach and mentor, and Frances Powell and her helpers for the excellent catering.

There have been many successes during 2013 in the Schools and Queensland Championships. Congratulations to Zazi Brennan and Caroline Pigerre and Harrison Wellingham on being selected and representing Queensland in the Queensland School Orienteering Team at the Australian Championships carnival in the ACT. Some of our younger members also participated in an interstate challenge organised by the ACT Blue Sparks.

In Mini Cyclones outstanding results in competition is not our primary goal. Rather we just want kids to get out and enjoy the challenge in the bush setting, and so develop a love of the natural world. Bush, not park or street orienteering, will remain our focus. We have a policy to include any club member in the 12-14 age group to become Mini Cyclones and receive a running shirt and coaching assistance, however no more than 50% of families take up the opportunity. Felicity Crosato is very good at signing up Range Runners members but the other clubs seem to be less successful. Perhaps we should all follow her example.

2013 Silva National Orienteering League

Sixteen Queenslanders represented the Cyclones over the thirteen rounds of the 2013 NOL season in Adelaide, Bendigo, and Canberra: seven women, five men, and two each of junior men and women.

The highlight of the NOL for the Cyclones was Heather Muir's win in the junior women. Muir competed in all twelve individual rounds, winning three and placing second in seven. These scores gave her a close win over former Queenslander, Jacqui Doyle. Allison Burrill finished sixteenth.

In the senior women's, Anna Sheldon, Rachel Effeney, who missed rounds 3-6, and Bridget Anderson had somewhat inconsistent seasons, finishing in ninth, tenth and twelfth respectively.

On the men's side of the league, junior David Tay displayed some promise with three steady rounds in the ACT in May, including a fifth place in Namadgi's technical granite in the ACT Middle Distance Championships and finished the season in fourteenth overall. The best senior result of the season was Mark Gregson's tenth place in the Australian Sprint Distance championships but a quiet national season saw him finish in only thirty ninth place over the season.

In the teams competition, the highlights was a close contest with the Tassie Foresters for third place in the women's competition. The Cyclones had a strong start to the season. Spearheaded by Rachel Effeney's sprint expertise and supported by a good turn-out and several steady performances they scored top points in round 1 in Adelaide. Despite Rachel's absences mid-season, the Cyclones were in equal third heading into the final round, the Australian Relay Championships and in the end only a single place in the relay relegated the Cyclones women to fourth.

The other three teams all suffered from a lack of numbers and erratic participation. They finished the season in fifth (men), seventh (junior men) and sixth (junior women).

Several Cyclones members were selected in national teams this year. Bridget Anderson, Rachel Effeney, Anna Sheldon, and Heather Muir (reserve) were selected for the New Zealand round of the World Cup held in January. The Cyclones were also represented in the Bushrangers vs Pinestars (NZ) test matches with Heather competing in the NZ match and Rachel in the ACT match. Heather did well to secure these spots in senior national teams while still a junior.

Summer Series

The Cyclones once again ran a series sprint races during the second half of the summer. Approximately 250 competitors enjoyed four races in some of Queensland's best urban sprint terrain. The series culminated in the novel format of the Sprint Special at Ferny Grove, where participants were challenged to a series of one-on-one sprint showdowns, until only the victor remained.

All members of the Cyclones contributed to the Summer Series, which helps to raise funds for competing in the National Orienteering League. The Cyclones also organised and set the badge event at the wonderful granite terrain of Rosenthal Ck in September. Thanks to Lilian Burrill for setting, Mat McGuire for organising and the numerous volunteers who helped on the day.



New and Departing Members

In 2013 we welcomed two new athletes to the squad and farewelled others. Paulo Alvear Fujii and Tim Effeney both competed in their first NOLs. Unfortunately, Tim has injured his knee and won't be competing in 2014.

We farewell Mikko Salonen, who returned home to Finland with his family, and also Bridget Anderson, who has defected to the Southern Arrows after several years living in Adelaide, and similarly Laurina Neumann, who now lives in Bendigo, Victoria.

Officials

Particular thanks to Mathieu McGuire who managed the Cyclones for a second season, ensuring everyone was organised and registered for the interstate competitions. Anna Sheldon was the Cyclones Coach once again and played her usual key role in controlling the Summer Series. Mark Gregson was the Cyclone's Captain.

Promotion and Development

An updated version of the Starter Pack was produced early in the year and distributed to the clubs to assist new people to learn more about orienteering.

OQ participated in the Queensland Outdoor Recreation Federation's Active Outdoors Expo at Northshore Riverside Park at Hamilton on 5 October. As well as a display, there were courses offered around the park with quite a few family groups taking up the opportunity to try out orienteering.

The Brisbane clubs continued their involvement with the Brisbane City Council's Active Parks Program, while Enoggeroos also organised events for the Moreton Bay Regional Council's Active For Life program. Toowoomba's Range Runners Club conducted a series of park events for their Council's Change program. These activities are providing a good opportunity for clubs to promote orienteering in the local community, using the Councils' publicity and marketing resources.

Media

Regular coverage of orienteering remained strong in regional outlets, particularly Toowoomba, Warwick and Stanthorpe but very sporadic in the statewide and Brisbane media. However, the Courier Mail's *Weekend* section had an excellent feature on orienteering on 1 March and the *Northside Chronicle* did a good article in May on Heather Muir and her inclusion in the Australian JWOC team.



Regional Development

Cairns

Additional maps of local schools, parks and the Cairns campus of James Cook University were made during the year plus an additional bush map on the Atherton Tablelands. The existing street O map of the Cairns CBD was also extended.

A successful bush event was conducted in April on the Atherton Tablelands and two series of three park/street O events were conducted in June/July and again in August/September.

Participation at these events continues to be high which is very encouraging for the future of orienteering in Far North Queensland.

Rockhampton

Additional mapping of three schools, the campus of the Central Queensland University and two new bush areas was undertaken and extensions to existing park maps was also completed mid-year. A series of seven park events were conducted in Rockhampton during August to October with funding from the Australian Sports Commission's Participation Program. Although only modest attendances were achieved, there was continued enthusiasm for the sport from participants and local schools.

Gympie

A Level O coaching course was conducted for 17 local teachers in Gympie in August with interest for extending orienteering activities into local bush areas as well.

Gold Coast

Thanks to the very active efforts of Mark Roberts, the Paradise Lost club was revived during the year and a regular program of park events was organised, with good attendances. Mark updated many of the existing park maps as well as creating a large number of new ones.

Toowoomba

The Range Runners Orienteering Club conducted two series of street O events in February and again in October, with funding from the Australian Sports Commission's Participation Program. Attendance numbers were very good at these events and helped introduce a lot of new people to the sport. Further school maps were made in the city with increasing interest from a number of local primary and secondary schools.

External Grants

A number of clubs were again successful in obtaining grants to help with equipment purchases and club development, particularly from Volunteers Grants and the Gambling Community Benefit Fund. The Brisbane City Council's Healthy and Physical Activity Grants Program also provided a useful source of funds for local club projects. The Department of Communities *Get Going* grants provided funding for the purchase of Sportident equipment for both the Range Runners and Bullecourt Boulder Bounders clubs while Toohey Forest received funding for bush coaching activities.

Hi-Tech

There have been further purchases of Sportident equipment in 2013. Sportident kits are owned by most clubs in OQ and many events are conducted solely with the use of club equipment. Central stores of SI equipment are mainly only in use for major OQ events. We are seeing the gradual upskilling of quite a number of members in the use of both the OE and the Or event organisation programs. This is a pleasing development and clubs are encouraged to continue to train new people.

The focus of information transfer continues to be the OQ web-site. All events are listed on this site and associated results are uploaded to the OA results web-site. Other states are slowly moving towards using the OA supported Eventor system. OQ will need to consider if and when they should also move to using this system.

As in previous years, the collection of statistical information at events remains problematic. Statistics are being compiled by John Cooper and are also collected by the OA results system. However this information is still only as good as the information that is supplied and all clubs are encouraged to enter all participants as individuals into an event (even if only charged as a group) and to collect age and gender data.

Mapping

The year saw an extensive mapping program undertaken across the state. Further bush, park and school mapping occurred around Cairns with a combination of funds from the Australian Sports Commission's Participation Program as well as from OQ's mapping budget.

Further park, sprint and bush mapping projects were undertaken in Central Queensland around Rockhampton and Yeppoon to support the Australian Sports Commission sponsored participation program.Two school maps were produced in Gympie as a result of interest from local teachers.

The existing park maps on the Gold Coast

were all updated and a number of new ones produced. A mapping workshop was conducted near Charters Towers in June with participants from Cairns and Townsville attending. An enthusiastic group of six prospective fieldworkers turned out for a weekend mapping workshop at Leyburn State Forest in November. They also participated in a school mapping workshop in Toowoomba in December.

Considerable time was spent early in the year in providing comment on the current review of the 2000 International Specification for Orienteering Maps to enable Orienteering Australia to produce a consolidated view of the changes from Australian mappers.

Technical

A course planning workshop was conducted in Toowoomba in February which attracted 13 participants. Course planning workshops were also held in Cairns and Townsville during the year, attracting 11 participants.

In conjunction with Orienteering Australia, considerable work was put into reviewing and updating the list of the accredited Queensland controllers listed with the Australian Sports Commission. Felicity Crosato (RR) and John Baker (EN) became accredited as Level 1 controllers and Murray Haines (BUSH), Greg Chatfield (UG) and Craig Steffens (MTB) were upgraded to Level 2. A Level 1 controller's course was conducted in Brisbane in February with 5 participants and a Level 2 workshop was held in Brisbane in November with three participants who have since been updated to Level 2 controllers - Reid Moran (TF), James Schulmeister (UG) and Anna Sheldon (UG).

Both RROC and BBB clubs received grants to enable them to purchase their own Sportident equipment and most weekend events in South East Queensland are now running as pre-enter and using Sportident.

The OQ online event entry system developed a few years ago continues to be very effective in managing the range of events run by Queensland clubs.

A complete revision of the OQ's Technical Manual was begun with a view to making it accessible on the website rather than in its existing printed form.

The 2013 Queensland Championships were organised by Ugly Gully and conducted at White Rock on 10-11 August, attracting 156 competitors, including 20 from interstate and 2 from overseas. For the first time, the Saturday event became a middle distance race for all competitors while the Sunday event was a long distance.


Participation statistics





Mid-Week Orienteering

We had another great year in Mid Week Orienteering. The number of participants was over 34 each week and resulted in total numbers of over 1500 for the whole year. We schedule an event every week of the year from February to December, and commit to them whatever the weather and conditions, unless, as happened on two occasions this year, it is impossible such as floods or no access on the day.

The events are organized by our regulars who mostly volunteer for at least one event a year. Others help in the background. This results in a great social atmosphere at our events with little fuss and bother, but with a professional edge in the orienteering runs. We offer three hard courses; short, medium and long; length, climb and seasonal climate are taken into account. However we do recognize the lesser experienced and offer instruction and advice when needed.

We vary the events as much as possible and always look out for new maps and areas. Sometimes BBQs are organized or just individual lunches are eaten while debating the route choices of the day. A good way to get involved and meet new people.

We also offer an additional easy course when we are sponsored by the Brisbane City Council GOLD and GOLD 'n Kids programs. We find that the GOLD 'n Kids events attract the most new people since they are always on during school holidays. At these sponsored events we give full instruction.

The Mid Week Championships were held at Mt Coot-tha, twice, since the first time we had a raging bushfire nearby and were refused permission on the day. However we held it again in November very successfully.

We had two events which were rather too ambitious for our organization. Toohey Forest on Anzac Day which attracted 120 competitors, and Windermere, incorporating Rocks Riverside with 90 participants.

Judi Hay provided some variety in two events at Seven Hills. An American Independence Day on July 4th and again at Christmas with a course that looked like a Christmas tree. Anyway they are good excuses for parties.

One major innovation this year has been the successful introduction of a computer program for starts and finishes initiated by John Cooper. This enables an accurate recording and quick assessment of results. It produces results in the format required by the website and a good basis for statistics. It is good for any event not using Sport Ident.

A very big thanks to all our organisers, without whom we would not be able to put on such a varied program throughout the Brisbane area all through the year. As usual, everyone is welcome!

Mountain Bike Orienteering

Events

Eleven Rider of the Year MTBO events were conducted during the year mainly by the MTB and SO clubs. BBB also organised one of these events, using the Passchendaele State Forest, north west of Stanthorpe. In addition to these events, the clubs also organised a number of promotional CATI and training days. The Far North Orienteers conducted an MTBO event in October and attracted good numbers.

OQ hosted the 2013 Australian MTBO Championships at Gympie on 27 and 28 July using the Corella State Forest north of the city for a middle distance event and the Toolara pine plantation, east of Gympie, for a long distance event. The event attracted 115 participants, including 33 from interstate and 22 from New Zealand.

The Queensland MTBO Championships were held on 7 and 8 September in the plantation forests near Beerburrum and were organised by the SO club.

Team Representation

Chris Firman (EN) and Karl Withers (EN) were selected in the Australian senior and junior men's team to contest the World Mountain Bike Orienteering Championships which were held in Estonia in August.

Queensland Storm

The Queensland Storm team performed well in the National League events during 2013, gaining a 5th placing in M21E and a 2nd in W21E, a 1st placing in M-20E and a 6th in W-20E to give it a 3rd placing overall in the elite rankings. Karl Withers achieved the top ranking in the M-20E class overall, as did his sister, Gaby, in the W-16 class.

In the Masters classes, Queensland Storm riders were generally in the top three rankings and overall were in second place. Placegetters in the Masters classes rankings included second placing to Norah Skilton (W50), Julie Fisher (W60) and Craig Steffens (M40).

Technical

It has been agreed that an additional course needs to be added to the existing 5 courses offered at ROY and Qld Championships events where the terrain is likely to be steep or rough, to take account of older and younger riders who currently ride on Course 5. This course will be approximately 2/3 of the length of Course 5 and will cover the age classes W12, W14+, W70, W80+ and M80+, with it also being offered as a Recreational Course for newcomers.

Promotion

A card promoting MTBO was updated early in the year with 2,000 copies being produced and distributed to clubs.

The Sunshine Orienteers participated in a feature story on MTBO for the *Totally Wild* TV program that went to air nationally on 7 August. They also contributed to a feature article about MTBO in the Courier Mail's *Great Weekend* supplement on 26 July.

Grants

Gambling Community Benefit Fund Grant

In February 2012 TFO lodged an application for a grant of \$5,106 from the Gambling Community Benefit Fund for a SPORTident School and Training set, including SPORTident units. In June 2012 the Office of Liquor and Gaming Regulation (OLGR) informed TFO that a grant of \$5,106 had been awarded to TFO for the purchase of the timing system. Items covered by the grant were acquired in March 2013 and the equipment has been put to use at our events throughout the year.

Get in the Game - Get Going Grant

TFO applied to the Department of National Parks, Recreation, Sport and Racing (NPRSR) for \$1,158 funding under the "Get in the Game - Get Going" program to fund a coaching program to encourage new participants. The grant was approved with the acquittal of the grant funding due by 31 March 2014. The club committee decided to split the funding over two coaching programs, the second building on the first. The first series of 4 coaching sessions was held in November 2013. The second series was scheduled for February 2014.

NOTE 1:

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounts are a special purpose financial report and have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards issued by the Australian Accounting bodies and the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (Queensland).

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the following Australian Accounting Standards: AAS 5 Materiality AAS 8 Events Occurring After Reporting Date

No other applicable Accounting Standards, Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views or other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board have been applied.

The report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical cost except where stated, and does not take into account changing money values or current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Association in the preparation of the financial statements.

(A) Incorporation

Orienteering Queensland Inc. is officially incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981.

(B) Income Tax

Generally, by virtue of Section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act, sporting bodies are exempt from Income Tax. However, should any income tax liability arise in the future such liabilities can only relate to the net assessable income generated from investment or other activities which are not directly associated with contributions, subscriptions or other receipts from members.

(C) Inventories

Inventories , when held, are valued at the lesser of cost or net realisable value.

(D) Fixed Assets

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over their useful life to the Association. The carrying amount of fixed assets is reviewed annually by the Committee of Management to ensure that it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of these assets.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the assets useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Report on the 2013 Financial Statement

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Orienteering Queensland Inc., which comprises the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2013, the statement of comprehensive income for the year then ended, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the members' assertion statement.

Members' Responsibility for the Financial Report

The members of Orienteering Queensland Inc. are responsible for the preparation of the financial report, and have determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1, is appropriate to meet the requirements of the Association Incorporations Act (QLD) 1981 and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. The members' responsibility also includes such internal control as the members determine is necessary to enable the preparation of a financial report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial report based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we comply with relevant ethical requirements relating to audit engagements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial report is free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgement, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial report, whether due to fraud or error.
