

President's Report

2020 has been a difficult year, affecting orienteering in Queensland. The effects of Covid-19 have been felt worldwide.

Orienteering in Queensland, with the help of all the clubs, has continued to provide a range of outdoor orienteering activities not only in events but in training, in course setting, controlling events, coaching and mapping. We have street, park, bush, MTBO, Night Nav and MapRun Parks events, all run by volunteers.

Some members have put in a lot of time planning and course setting for events only to have them cancelled or postponed due to Covid-19. Both national championships of Easter and the Australian Championships were postponed to 2021.

We have still managed to have regional development and activities and welcome a new club 21 Degrees South Multisport Association.

Orienteering Queensland gets income from events, membership fees and grants including the State Government grant without which we would not survive. Due to the lack of events this year in which members could compete, it was decided to roll over membership to 2021 to help all members financially.

2020 started with night nav events both north and south of the Brisbane River.

February saw the start of the Cyclones Sprint series, there was a workshop at events in Toowoomba, TTOC started their urban adventure events, MapRun Parks started at New Farm Park and Bullecourt Boulders also had a MapRun Parks event.





March saw OY1 and the AGM being able to be held at UQ Gatton and a few events were able to be held. Midweek orienteering resumed, then Covid restrictions hit and events were cancelled or postponed.

Orienteering Queensland worked out a set of guidelines for orienteering with information for organisers of what had to be provided to keep members safe as well as guidelines for start and finish procedures. The phrase 'arrive, compete then leave' came into play. Fortunately, by **May** we were able to have DIY night nav and MapRun Parks events. We also saw the new car wrecks challenge events as well as DIY MapRun MTBO events start. In **June**, a few individual events were held under Covid regulations and DIY MapRun events continued.

By **July**, a few bush events were held around Brisbane and Stanthorpe as well as a few closed events for schools.

August saw coaching days resume as well as closed school events. Night Nav continued due to the use of MapRunF as did the MapRun Park series. Under Covid restrictions and guidelines the Middle Distance Championships were also held at Bunyaville.

September saw the postponement of the Queensland Championships at Broadwater until October. An event well worth waiting for. The Sprint Championships were held at Nudgee







In **October** we were able to continue with orienteering under the strict Covid guidelines. There was a Rob Simson Memorial Seat event and Midweek Championships at Toohey Forest as well as being able to have the postponed Queensland Long Distance Championship.

November/December saw the Ugly Gully Park Series commence as well as Night Nav and MapRun Parks series continuing. A new event, the Santa 6 Days, was held over the Christmas New Year period, with a different event being released each day. Initially aimed for those unable to travel to NSW for the usual Xmas 5 days competition. When that was cancelled, it was available for everyone.

It has been pleasing to see the promotion of events and that newcomers are attending events especially Night Nav and MapRun Parks. A good job well done Linda. I would like to thank again all volunteers for their efforts in 2020, sometimes under difficult conditions. Without you we would not have any events and a special thank you to Peter Effeney, without whose MapRunF app 2020 would have been a totally different year, not only for Queensland, but for orienteers worldwide.

Performance

Athlete Development, Training squads, Coaching, Coaching Accreditation, Selection, Queensland Schools Orienteering Team

Orienteering Queensland's Performance program was limited through much of 2020 due to the Covid-19 restrictions and lockdowns, including our Ultra-Mini Cyclones, Mini Cyclones and Junior Camps; all NOL events; and the Australian Schools Orienteering Championships. Several workshops and a camp were possible however in the latter part of the year. Many of the activities were supported by our state government funding. Some of the activities conducted include:

- Conducting a coaching camp for the Queensland Cyclones with over 20 participants.
- Conducting three Level 0 coaching courses and one Level 1 coaching course.
- Conducting one mapping workshop.
- Assisting the Queensland Schools Committee with conducting the Queensland Schools Orienteering Championships.

Selections in National Teams:

The 2020 World Orienteering Championships, World Junior Orienteering Championships and World Mountain Bike Orienteering Championships were all cancelled due to Covid-19.

Coaching Accreditation:

Coaching accreditation is being streamlined through direction from Orienteering Queensland. At a state level, we run training courses for Level 0 and Level 1 coaches, and members are encouraged to consider participating in these courses to not only aid others, but to develop their own skills.

At the end of 2020 the officially recognised number of Orienteering Queensland coaches was:

Promotion and Development

Promotion


It has been a disjointed year to say the least. Promotion of events has had to be versatile and imaginative in order to keep up with the changing Covid-19 climate. Orienteering in Queensland has however, despite losing a number of months of traditional orienteering events due to Covid restrictions, made the most of the unique character of our sport (outdoors, non-contact and individual) and has adapted quickly to the altered conditions as few other sports have been able. The introduction of DIY events using MapRun during the Covid lockdowns, meant that orienteers and the sport-deprived community were provided with an alternative form of the sport, which has in the longer term brought many new faces into the sport. As the restrictions have eased further, OQ managed to get in a good number of bush events, but Night Nav and MapRun Parks events have made up the majority of events offered. Promotion of orienteering has focussed along three main pathways this year.

External Promotion:

- Prior to Covid, a number of articles were published in several <u>local newspapers</u> reporting on the success of our junior and senior athletes and advertising events in local areas. Unfortunately, local Quest newspapers have ceased operation (hopefully only temporarily, due to Covid). An article on Powerful Owl/QSOC was written for newspapers and Birds Queensland promoting orienteering as sport working within conservation guidelines.

 -During the Covid lockdown, promotion of events focussed on the <u>DIY format of Night Nav and MapRun events</u>, advertising them as widely as possible to the general population. Geoff Peck's <u>Car Wreck Challenge Series</u> were also promoted during this time and attracted both regular orienteers and newcomers to orienteering alike.
- -<u>Publicity Flyers</u> were designed for the major orienteering events (Come and Try Days, Ugly Gully Park O, Cyclones Sprint, DIY Night Nav (Brisbane and Sunshine Coast), OY Events, Rob Simson Memorial, State Championships, MapRun Parks Series, Car Wreck Challenges, Night Nav (Sunshine Coast, Toowoomba and Brisbane North, West and South), and publicised widely through Facebook and the Bulletin advertising. This attracted a large amount of interest from the wider public not already involved in orienteering and has seen a large increase in numbers at events. A3 posters and postcards of these were used to advertise the Ugly Gully Park-O and Santa 6 Day Series.







- -Gordon Bossley and I have further developed relationships between OQ and <u>Scouts</u>
 <u>Queensland and Guides Queensland</u> resulting in their attendance at several events, Gordon running several events for individual scouting groups and several leaders gaining their Level O coaching certificates.
- -Contact with a large number of schools developed through Sporting Schools and Events in their local area, resulted in the publication of several <u>school newsletter articles</u> promoting upcoming events and reporting on orienteering events within the school. Successes of junior orienteers at the QLD Champs and their selection in the QLD Schools Honour Team were also forwarded to the schools for recognition in the wider school community.
- -<u>Mailchimp Platform</u>: A lot of work was done to enter in the names, emails and postcodes of all (>1300) primary and secondary schools (in sporting regions), Scout Units (199) and Guide groups (142) in the Brisbane, Gold Coast, Darling Downs, Granite Belt and Sunshine Coast areas. This database is used regularly to contact these organizations when an orienteering event series (eg: Ugly Gully Park-O series, Cyclones Sprint Series, Come & Try Days) are being run in their local area. This method has been quite successful in getting word out via school/group/unit newsletters, thus widening promotion of our events, leading ultimately to an increase in newcomers at events.
- -Eventor introduced a new category for event registration, the '<u>OQ Casual'</u>, to help with Covid contact tracing and recording of casual participants details. All casual orienteers were contacted (>900) and encouraged to sign up via a Google Form which were then entered into Eventor. These details were also used for promotion.
- -A submission of MapRun and DIY MapRun in the <u>Play by the Rules Awards</u> resulted in OQ being showcased state-wide as an exemplar of how clubs/organizations were innovative in maintaining their sport during Covid restrictions.
- -Advertising of a <u>Sporting Schools Promotion</u> to primary schools suggesting orienteering as a sport that could be used for this program resulted in several new school signing up to the program.





Newcomer Retention:

- -The <u>Casual Orienteer's Bulletin</u> is published monthly containing event information, coaching tips, membership details and general beginner's information and is emailed to all people who enquire about orienteering via Facebook or the Website, who attend an event for the first time and non OQ members (over 300 on the distribution list).
- -Contact is being made with <u>regular Night Nav and MapRun Parks Series</u> participants, encouraging them to orienteering events. Thanks to Juliana, Reece and Peter for regular updates on participant lists.

-The requirement for electronic registrations has made the task of maintaining contact with newcomers much easier and has been a blessing in disguise from the Covid restrictions.

Internal Communication:

-The <u>OQ Bulletin</u> is distributed to over 650 people weekly. During the Covid lockdown the Bulletin was re-structured to include articles to maintain interest in orienteering and to develop skills where possible. These included publication of maps and routes of past international events to encourage thought about route choice, video clips of elite orienteers out on their courses, word and mind puzzles with an orienteering theme, training articles that could be done at home or in the local area. The modified Bulletin was well received, with many requests to keep the puzzles going after lockdowns were over. Since Covid restrictions have eased, the emphasis has been on more event and people focused articles and more general interest stories to encourage interest.

The Bulletin is also posted on Facebook (increasing its distribution by a further 1500 people) and back-copies from 2019 onwards are available on the OQ website.







-OQ Facebook Page — Facebook has huge potential to promote orienteering to the wider community, reaching members of the community who otherwise would not be reached by our advertising. It has been a goal to increase the number of OQ FB page followers this year. This has been achieved by using 'boosted' or paid FB promotions which target audiences in the area of an event series and reaches target audiences (families, those interested in running, the outdoors, adventure etc). These promotions have been immensely successful with the event advertisements going out to over 5000 people each time and receiving many shares, likes and comments. It has most importantly seen an increase in the number of newcomers attending these events. The number of OQ FB followers has increased by over 25% in the last year to almost 1500. Followers see in their FB feed every article (including events) that are posted by OQ. Every orienteering event also is published as an individual 'event' on FB giving full event details, which people show their interest in. Many receive high attention (likes, shares and comments).

Technical

2020 proved a challenging year for managing the technical aspects of orienteering due to Covid. Just as our 2020 calendar was kicking off all events were cancelled, including our national events. When things eventually got going again our organising teams needed to make a range of adjustments to the way our events were run to meet Covid guidelines and ensure our events were run safely. This has included increased use of Si Air and MapRun at events.

Once our events could re-commence, we focused on the OY and championship events, and managed to complete all of our scheduled championships and enough races for a full OY season.

Four successful championship races were held during the year, with great examples of Qld terrain. The sprint and long-distance races were held on excellent new maps at Nudgee College and Broadwater State Forest, and the middle made great use of one of our oldest maps at Bunyaville State Forest.

The QLD Sprint Distance Champs were held at Nudgee College, hosted by Enoggeroos.

The QLD Long Distance Champs were held at Broadwater State Forest by Ugly Gully.

The QLD Middle Distance Champs were hosted by Enoggeroos at Bunyaville.

The QLD MTBO champs were hosted by Sunshine Orienteers at Boondall, Narangba and Beerburrum, with the events held in honour of Gordon Howitt – one of the pioneers of MTBO in Qld.

Several clubs ran course setting, event organising and use of SportIdent. In 2020 we also started requiring event organisers to do an online induction to ensure they are aware of safety requirements for our events.

The cancellation of national events in 2020 has also meant that our national calendar was pushed back by a year, so Qld will host the national Easter carnival and NOL races in 2022.

Junior Development & Queensland Schools Orienteering Team

Australian Schools Championships – (Tasmania - Cancelled due to Covid-19)

COVID-19 restrictions on gatherings meant that unfortunately neither Mini-Cyclones camp, Junior Camp nor the Qld Schools Orienteering Championships could go ahead as planned in May and July. And the cancellation of the Australian Championships meant that we were unable to send a Qld Schools Team to Tasmania to compete in September.

All was not lost, however, and we offered a modified program, culminating in the selection of a Queensland Schools Orienteering Honour Team 2020.

In late July, we held a coaching day at Opossum Creek Springfield. Coaches Su Yan Tay, Felicity Crosato, Marion, Phil & Simeon Burrill, Grant & Blake Reinbott, and Riley de Jong worked intensively with juniors at easy, moderate and hard level.

Two OY events in September were designated as Schools Medal Races. Students competed for the Sprint Medal at Nudgee College and the Forest Medal at Ripley. Medals were awarded to:

The Committee wishes to express its gratitude to Wendy, and to Reid Moran before her, for their able stewardship of junior orienteering, and we welcome Neil Gannon as the incoming Chair.

Sporting Schools Program

In the Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast and Brisbane area we worked with 9 schools in 2020, a significant shortfall compared (17) to 2019.

Repeat customers were Samford SS, St Pauls School Bald Hills (5 years running!). 5 new maps were drawn during the year.

A curious positive relationship – Ithaca Creek State School has continued to engage us outside the Sporting Schools funding model.

Following on from their program, we delivered a 3-session intra-school program for Inala State School, with HPE teacher Peter Naoum. This was conducted as one of the very few outings the school was able to make happen, given Covid restrictions. And it was in lieu of the planned Southern Scorpions Interschool series, which was scotched due to Covid. Sadly Peter has departed the school and moved to Finland.

We're hopeful of making the Southern Scorpions Interschool series happen in 2021 with a Term 2 start.

And the good news from Met-Northwest District School Sport is that our orienteering program is scheduled for earlier in the year – we're optimistic that these two programs will generate additional interest from the schools in each catchment.

In the SEQ catchment, coaching was carried out by Thomas Garbellini, Ryan Gray, Reid Moran, Dominic Crosato and Gordon Bossley.

In regional Queensland, we again worked with 7 schools. However, only 3 of the programs were run by our coaches (Annette Rogers, Marion Burrill and Dominic Crosato), with the other four being teacher led in remote schools. However, we engaged with a further 3 schools outside the sporting schools program, all in the same town — Chinchilla State School, Chinchilla SHS and St Joseph's School. Keith Grayson also helped Kepnoch High School in Bundaberg with a program.

Regional Development

Due to the restrictions, Rob and Felicity were only able to make one trip and that was to Chinchilla where we ran two events attracting nearly 40 new people. We have mapped the local Botanic Parkland and set up permanent courses there.

The new club in Mackay was finally able to run its first event. They chose to run it using the MapRun app though they do have a grant to buy SI equipment and are hoping to use that in 2021.

Palm Island showed great interest in both a school program and Level 0 training, but due to Covid restrictions, they were unable to follow through. Hopefully this will go ahead in 2021. Dominic Crosato was invited to Thargomindah, to the Small Schools Sports Program at the end of September, but that was also cancelled.

Membership Statistics

There has been a 10% decrease in the number of memberships in 2020 compared to the previous year. This equates to a net drop of 29 members. There was a 20% non-renewal rate from 2019 (100 members), offset largely by a 14% increase from new memberships during the year, made up of 15 new families and 15 new seniors (71 members in total). Refer to the tables below.

A new club called "21Degrees South Multisport", from Mackay (MKQ) was affiliated into the association during the year.

Due to the effects of Covid19 on events during the year, the committee decided to roll over the 2020 memberships into 2021 at no additional charge to members.

Mid-Week Orienteering Group

We endeavour to organise Mid Week events every Thursday during the year from March to November. COVID-19 this year meant that we had to cancel events between 19th March and 18th June. Still, Mid Week events finished later and started earlier than other OQ official events, complying with all the pandemic restrictions.

It is intended to continue with starting times at 10.30-11.00 a.m. in 2021, to avoid heat extremes, but still avoiding peak hour traffic. We get about 15-40 participants each week depending on location and weather conditions, and attempt to have a good mix of park and bush events. We have a reputation of organizing events with as little fuss as possible and continue to have a relaxed, but professional approach to event management.







Organising one of our days is a very good way into getting into the detail of orienteering at the base level. Help is always offered and guidelines are available. We always have three Hard courses Short, Medium and Long, although park events are only Moderate level of difficulty. Seasonal conditions are taken into account when setting length and climb on courses. We offer instruction and advice when needed. The computer program for starts and finishes initiated by John Cooper, and managed by John and Matthew Ross, enables an accurate recording and quick assessment of results.

Additional Easy courses are set during school holidays and when we are sponsored by the Brisbane City Council GOLD programs. We had five GOLD events this year and a further three scheduled and cancelled but still subsidized by the BCC sponsorship. We had four MapRuns this year.

Our Facebook page managed by Matthew Ross can also be accessed through the OQ website. He usually manages to put all the courses on the Facebook each week and provides a short commentary.



In October, we managed to have a special event in memory of Rob Simson, who was a keen supporter of Mid Week and of course a leading light in orienteering. Geoff Peck talked to Brisbane City Council about a memorial seat. It was constructed with the best materials in Rob's favourite spot. We organized a Mid Week event and over 60 people attended on a special map produced by Geoff. A BBQ lunch was provided and only the rain partly dampened the special occasion. It will be reported in the OA magazine in March 2021.

Thanks to all our organisers and supporters during the year. We hope to have a full and interesting program again in 2021. As usual, everyone of any age and experience is very welcome to attend!

Club Reports

Bullecourt Boulder Bounders (BB)

It was a different orienteering year, but despite the circumstances Bullecourt Boulder Bounders successfully managed to stage a series of events. As has been our usual practice in recent years the Club conducted events in Warwick in the hope of attracting some newcomers to the sport. The year began with a sprint at Warwick West State School and two MapRun events in Leslie Park, Queens Park and surrounds. There was a reasonable turnout with all enjoying the experience.



The Club organised an OY event in March at Glen Mine (Warwick), with around 100 orienteers competing. This was a new map completed by Stuart Watt which was a continuation of the Archery Club map.

Unfortunately, orienteering events in the local area underwent a hiatus in April and May due to a pesty pandemic. It meant a cancellation of some events and rescheduling of others to different areas. However, in July It was pleasing to see 41 orienteers at Passchendaele State Forest. This was followed up in August with 44 competing at Brooklands, in preparation for the Queensland Long Distance Championships at Broadwater. The Club's final event for the year was a score event and Club breakup at Braeside. A number of club members ventured further afield to get their orienteering fix.

After the State Championships a Queensland Schools Team was announced with club members Lochlann Hogan, Ewan McFarland and Ariona Laws being selected.





During the year three club meetings were conducted and as in previous years at the annual general meeting there were no surprise nominations with the incumbents continuing in their positions.

Club members continued to help develop the sport throughout the district with Marion Burrill coordinating the mini-cyclones and working with the primary schools, Liz Bourne worked with the gifted and talented camp at Storm King Dam, while Doug and Anne Wilson worked with Scots/PGC College in developing their orienteering programmes.

The Club has continued to apply for grants and was successful with the Covid Safe and Active Clubs Kickstart Grants. The Covid Grant allowed for the purchase of cleaning products, safety and information signs.


Enoggeroos Orienteering Club Inc (EN)

Multi Terrain Bike Orienteering Club (MT)

2020 threw up a few challenges in terms of the event restrictions caused by COVID19 but we were lucky to be able to park major carnivals and resume state events after an enforced pause. We made use of the downtime to map 2 new sites at the Boondall Entertainment Centre and the RACQ Motoring Centre of Excellence at Mt Cotton.



The Boondall Entertainment Centre site is almost totally flat and quite compact but proved rather challenging when combined with a map change. The network of mown fire trails around the site, combined with roads, walking tracks and expansive car parks had riders concentrating the whole way around their courses. We've earmarked this site for a championship event in future years.

The other new map at Mt Cotton is on a driver training centre once owned by the QLD Government and now in the hands of the RACQ group. We were able to negotiate access at well below commercial rates and the ensuing map and event didn't disappoint. Riders loved the paved road network, 4WD training tracks and open grassy areas spread over the undulating site. The use of a map change, 2 changes for longer courses, had riders making the best use of the sites features.





We also returned to an old favourite, the 'Log Cabin' map at Mt Crosby, which again challenged riders with hard climbs and long ride times. Some extra SEQ Water land meant more tracks and route choice and more lantana this time around!





Looking ahead we're staging the QLD Champs at Wondai in 2021 and the Australian Champs in Brisbane in 2022, so plenty of MTBO action to keep us engaged.

This was followed by the staging of the QLD MTBO champs, middle and long distance events including the Gordon Howitt Memorial event. It was great to see Kath Howitt and her family at the event. Course setters and organisers were Deb Gordon and again Mark Petrie.

Our annual bush foot event organised by evergreen Trevor Sauer, a Park-O and another 5 Night Nav events leading to our popular Xmas breakup and Poker Run at Caloundra, completed the season.

2020 has been an unusual year with major disruptions to the event program due to forced shutdowns associated with a global pandemic. This shut down nearly all activities for a 3-month period and some activities only resumed in modified form. All interstate carnivals were cancelled and are being rescheduled for next year.



In January prior to the pandemic shutdown we opened the year with three-night events at Meadowbrook, the much-updated Broadwater Park map and Whites Hill. Numbers were reasonable with about 30 participants each night.





March is the beginning of our main bush event season. This year we were to start with an OY event at Buhot Creek at the end of the month. The pandemic shutdown started a few days prior to the event, and it had to be cancelled.

To provide exercise opportunities during the lockdown a range of creative events were provided for free. These included Maprun events that could be undertaken at any time and Geoff Peck set some car wreck challenges. The car wreck challenge worked by using the car wrecks that existed on various maps as virtual controls. Competitors would submit their gps track to prove they had visited the correct location. The first of these was set at Toohey Forest.

Normal events, operating in a COVID safe manner, resumed in July. It was planned to reschedule the OY event at Buhot Creek in August but a conflict with another event and the short lead time made the date and an alternative venue impossible to bring off. Ultimately the event was able to proceed as a normal club event on the date normally reserved for the Australian long-distance championships (first weekend in October). Neil Simson was the course setter with Reid Moran as controller. About 80 competitors attended. All training camps that normally happen each year were cancelled due to the pandemic. Normally several club members would be involved in these.





The first championship event of the year was the Queensland Middle Distance Championships which were staged at Bunyaville in August. We had 11 members take part. They produced two 1sts and two 3rds. Our winners were Tony Tavner-Corner and Pam Cox. The Queensland Sprint Distance Championships were in September. We had 5 members take part. They produced a 2nd and three 3rds. The best performer was Jennifer Schulz. Mid October was the Queensland Long Distance Championships which were held near Stanthorpe. The late timing was due to problems getting permission to use a new area just outside the town. The map had been produced by Geoff Peck. The area was full of granite boulders of enormous size. The event attracted a large number of entries (~140) despite most interstate competitors (including those from Armidale) not being allowed to attend due to boarder closures. We had 8 members take part in this 2-day competition. Place getters in their classes were Johanna Tavner-Corner and Neil Simson (1st), Jennifer Schulz (2nd) and Jen Woods (3rd).





A three-event series of StreetNav events using Maprun are planned for December on the Macgregor, Salisbury and Norman Park maps.

On a sad note we remember Russell Creed who passed away early in the year. Russell had been a long-term member who due to his job could not attend events on a regular basis. Despite this Russell took part in events whenever he could including the Slovenian 5 days, Queensland long championships and the Australian championships carnival in 2019.



Membership

Membership is 97, up from 92 last year. We have gained 17 new members (or 18%) but have lost 12 members in 2020, resulting in a net increase of 5 members or 5%. We sadly lost James Sheldon in a tragic accident during the year.

Events

Members of the Club have organised 84 events throughout the year (up from 48 in 2019):

Development of the Sport

MapRun

MapRun, which is developed and supported by members of Ugly Gully, has now expanded into 35 countries and is registering approximately 8000 individual runs per month. It has been a key enabler of continued Orienteering during Covid lockdowns in a wide range of locations. Its success was recognised in the annual QORF awards, where its developer, Peter Effeney, was a finalist in the Individual Achievement category.







Mapping

It has been back to a busy year for mapping. The highlight was the new map at Broadwater near Stanthorpe facilitated by Ugly Gully. The team of Greg Chatfield, Rob Rapkins and James Mitchell put on a wonderful Long Distance Champs in an otherwise difficult year due to Covid-19.

A number of minor updates have also been actioned including Slaughter Falls and Bergins Hill. And many more are in the pipeline for updates including St Peters, UQ, Mt Coot-tha Botanic Gardens and a host of small updates by Mark Roberts. Several of these are funded by a Queensland government grant.

And continuing the "re-discovery" of the Springfield area as parks are created and new access points to the bush are formed, two updates for Opossum and Springfield Lakes have been completed, one of which will be for an OY in 2021.

It is a great reflection of all UG club members that as of November 2020, all maps, controllers and setters are already in place for our 2021 OYs and the maps are all of the highest quality.

Thanks to Brenton Gray for his work on mapping again this year.

21 Degrees South Multisport Association (MKQ)

It is my pleasure to deliver the 2nd Annual Report on behalf of the Management Committee and would like to welcome you all to the 2020 AGM.



Firstly, I would like to congratulate and thank our Management Committee and all the members for an unforgetable year. It has been remarkable what we have achieved in twelve months financially without holding an event. We have engaged in four general meetings and had three proposals successfully passed online.

Thank you to all members for paying their membership and supporting the association. We were successful with our 2019 submission to the Mackay Regional Council for a grant to set up the association with equipment. We now have compasses, check points, punch cards, whiteboards, start/finish flags and a first aid kit. We had to suspend our insurance thanks to COVID for six months but a positive to come out of COVID was the funding that was made available. Our association was successful with three grants. First for \$2000 from the Department of Sport and Recreation – COVID SAFE Active Clubs Kickstart – this submission was one that we didn't think we would qualify for but we thought we should give it a go, and so the application was submitted with an orienteering focus of introducing the community to the sport. The second was from the Mackay Regional Council — COVID 19 Recovery Grant for \$5000 which can be used for insurance expenses, activity and event expenses - online registrations, online event management and resources. As a result, we have been able to pay for our insurance for twelve months and will support Tri-ActiV8 with some of the running costs involved with the Kid's and the Uniteability Triathlons. The third for \$8 329 from the Department of Sport and Recreation as part of the Active Restart Infrastructure Recovery Fund – this submission was under the guidance of Orienteering Queensland (OQ) for the purchase of a contactless timing system and tablet which fits in with the COVID safety plans.





So we began the year by supporting Nikki and Peter Lister with an Aqua Mach application for an Australia Day grant which was unsuccessful. However, we showed our support and the event went ahead with great feedback from all involved. On the 29th February, we supported Tri-ActiV8 with the Kid's and Uniteability Triathlons. We had our best ever roll up of Uniteability participants and could not thank them enough for giving it a go.

Then COVID hit but a positive that came out of this time was our affiliation with OQ, and I must say a special thanks to Cath Meng for participating in the OQ meetings. We had to wait until October before we could think about what Zach Mach was going to look like. Thanks to the efforts of Cara and Cath Meng, we were able to set up a small orienteering event in the middle of the Mini Mach. They set out the course and coordinated with the event organises over several weekends what it was going to look like. Thanks to all who were able to help them out on the day.

Notes to and forming part of the Accounts

NOTE 1

The accounts are a special purpose financial report and have been prepared in accordance with the requirements of the Associations Incorporations Act (Queensland).

The Management Committee considers that the accounting policies as described below are appropriate to the members understanding of the transactions of the entity during the year and the accounting framework is acceptable in the circumstances, providing a true and fair view of this financial report.

The report is prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical cost except where stated, and does not take into account changing money values or current valuations of non-current assets. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Association in preparation of financial statements.

(A) Incorporation

Orienteering Queensland Inc. is officially incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act 1981.

(B) Income Tax

Generally, by virtue of Section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act, sporting bodies are exempt from Income Tax. However, should any income tax liability arise in the future such liabilities can only relate to the net assessable income generated from investment or other activities which are not directly associated with contributions, subscriptions or other receipts from members.

(C)Inventories

Inventories, when held, are valued at the lesser of cost or net realisable value.

(D) Fixed Assets

The depreciable amounts of all fixed assets are depreciated over their useful life to the Association. The carrying amounts of fixed assets are reviewed annually by the Committee of Management to ensure that it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of these assets.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets including buildings and capitalised lease assets, but excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight line basis over the assets useful life to the entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

(E) Related Party Transactions

It is noted that there are many related party transactions within the financial statements. These transactions are reported at cost which is at or below expected commercial rates.

(F) Income

Income is recorded when received from Clubs, adjusted for year end accruals. Such income cannot always be authenticated by the Entity.

(G) Expenses

Expenses associated with direct grant funding have been reported by grant category not expense category. Prior year expenses have been consolidated to align with grant expenditure to form reliable comparative figures.
